COMMUNITY Vocational Education Program

Customized employment for young adults



A 2004 study by the Canadian Abilities Foundation found that most people with disabilities want to work, and would rather work than collect disability benefits.



Ranch Ehrlo's Community Vocational Education Program (CVEP) provides a variety of pre-vocational and vocational services designed to assist people with mental and/or psychological disabilities develop and improve work skills and work attitudes.

CVEP is designed to meet the training and employment needs of young adults who are not benefiting from traditional school and vocational services. The goal is paid community-based employment for each student, regardless of the severity of their disability.

Our program is non-discriminatory, and participants are accepted without bias to gender, age, race, religion, or socio-economic status. We operates on a twelve month basis, providing a warm, nurturing and supportive environment for all of our clients.

Program details

- CVEP is a community-based program, designed to teach and assist participants in all aspects of the employment process.
- The program addresses and develops knowledge in areas such as employment skills, functional literacy, money management, addiction education, social skills, and driver training.
- Participants are taught employment expectations, work skills and work habits including punctuality, respectful conduct and proper dress and decorum.
- On-site, the participants will be under the constant supervision of a job coach who will provide assistance and support in these areas. Additionally, a vocational resource trainer will assist in guiding the participants' development.

Training plan

Within the first month of enrollment in the CVEP, a detailed vocational training plan will be developed for each trainee. This plan will include personal goals and expected outcomes, using a variety of resources.

The CVEP runs weekly from Monday to Friday, excluding statutory holidays and professional development days. Participants are expected to arrive at the CVEP between 8:30 and 9 a.m. and will be returned to their homes shortly after 3 p.m.

Evaluation

In the short-term, trainees will be evaluated on their commitment, attendance, and progress in the various components of the program.

The long-term evaluation will focus on the abilities of students to obtain and maintain permanent work placement at various levels of skill development at the emerging, partial success, or mastery levels.
